

**Centennial Animal Services
September 2011 Monthly Progress Report
September 20, 2011**

Summary

Centennial Animal Services (CAS) remained committed to protecting the safety, health, and quality of life in Centennial while protecting the welfare of animals during September 2011. These efforts resulted in Animal Welfare Officers responding to 728 calls for service to include: 33 dogs at large, 28 noisy pets, 354 animal license checks, 19 animal impounds, 11 bite cases and 8 aggressive animals. The Department investigated 26 complaints of animal cruelty and responded to 3 animal rescues. There were 689 telephone calls received and 41 lost and found animal reports taken.

Enforcement activities resulted in 43 individuals being educated/verbal warnings, 39 written warnings, 15 summons and complaints being issued and 26 animals handled. CAS vigorously pursues reuniting pets with their owners and finding new homes for all animals handled. These efforts resulted in 69% animal save rate (including wildlife) with 15% of animals returned in the field, 33% returned from the kennel, and 19% being transferred to adoption partners.

2011 Goals/Progress

City Services

Maintain efficient and effective animal care and control services that enhance public safety, health and the welfare of animals while maintaining department and City values.

Goals

- Sustain complete transparency through Monthly Performance Reports and Key Performance Measures
- Track, measure and maintain response times within levels established by policy and procedures
- Complete a minimum of 450 calls for service per month (5,400 per year)
- Thoroughly investigate all reports of aggressive animals and animal bites
- Strive to maintain a 90% Live Release Rate

Progress

- Finalized new performance measurements.
- Averaged 810 calls for service per month well exceeding the goal of 450 calls per month.
- 84% animal live release rate—89% excluding wildlife.

Community Quality of Life/Citizen Engagement

Centennial Animal Services will provide responsible pet ownership education and engage in positive community relations to promote a community where animals are inherently valued and owners are committed to their pets.

Goals

- Participate in Centennial sponsored community events
- Be available to attend District, CENCon, and HOA Meetings
- Continue use of media outlets and newsletter to educate citizens about responsible pet ownership
- Explore use of online social networks to increase community awareness and education opportunities
- Attend and provide basic CAS presentation at ACSO Centennial shift reports

Progress

- Staff led or participated in 7 public events during August 2011 to include two presentations to Arapahoe County Sheriff Office Dispatchers/Call Takers
- Continue to provide proactive increased patrols to provide public education and be more available in the community—76 patrols completed

Economic Health

Remain fiscally responsible by investing in smart programs which maximize operational effectiveness while ensuring the protection of public safety, health and the welfare of animals.

Goals

- CAS will aggressively pursue cost recovery efforts by increasing license sales and maximizing the collection of animal related fees.
- Continue to explore the possibility of regionalizing animal care and control programs
- Develop and implement an animal licensing marketing/public relations campaign
- Implement an online animal licensing program

Progress

- Issued 181 animals licenses
- Cost recovery efforts 47% above year to date revenue budget
- 17.58% of animals licensed—highest in City's history

Environment

Reduce the carbon footprint of CAS by more efficiently and effectively deploying forces while minimizing the use of paper products by fully utilizing technology.

Goals

- Implement GIS Mapping, Chameleon software, and Global Positioning Systems to more effectively deploy and utilize staff
- Work towards and secure funding to equip CAS vehicles with Mobile Data Terminals to more closely control the amount of driving required and decrease the quantity of printing
- Maximize opportunities for staff to conduct bicycle and foot patrol to minimize the use of fossil fuels and promote a healthy lifestyle


Progress

- Staff members scheduled to attend Bike Patrol training with Arapahoe County Sheriff Office—requesting budget to begin program in 2012 and training has been secured
- Continued to increase foot patrols in known dog at large problem areas
- Have reduced total miles driven to date by 19% to date while significantly increasing calls for service
- Mobile computers with GPS that will be integrated into Chameleon software on order and expected to be operational by November 2011—system once deployed and operational will allow more efficient deployment of forces and mapping of calls for service.

Field Services



Calls for Service




Centennial Animal Services has responded to 7,288 calls for service YTD – 1,179 in District 1, 1,351 in District 2, 3,044 in District 3, 1,555 in District 4, and 159 outside of the City. New Districts incorporated into statistics February 14, 2011.

Calls for Services by District



Attempts to educate and mediate are most often the first method of resolution. When these techniques fail a written warning or summons and complaint may be issued. These methods help to reduce the number of repeat offenders, animals impounded, and more effectively manage long-term problems. The actions taken to enhance public safety and protect animal welfare have resulted in 448 education/verbal warnings, 273 written warnings, and 130 summons and complaints year to date.


Actions Taken



The term Dangerous or Potentially Dangerous Animal (DA/PDA) refers to any response that results from a report of a domestic animal displaying threatening behaviors (growling, hackles raised, baring teeth, chasing, charging), making aggressive physical contact with a person or domestic animal, or causing bodily or serious bodily injury. An animal bite occurs when a bite from a domestic or wild animal causes a break in the skin of a human. Every DA/PDA and animal bite is promptly investigated and appropriate action is taken.

The numbers of DA/PDA Reports, Animal Bites, Citations Issued for DA/PDA, and Animals Confiscated as a result of citations issued are reported below. Year to date CAS has conducted 52 DA/PDA Investigation, processed 60 Animal Bites, Issued 3 DA/PDA Summons, and Confiscated 4 Animals.


Dangerous & Potentially Dangerous Animals




Animals Handled

Year to date CAS has handled 281 animals: 227 Dogs, 36 Cats, 14 wild animals, and 4 Others. 84% of these animals have been saved with 89% of domestic animals being saved (excludes wildlife).


Animals Handled

Year to Date Animal Outcomes




■ Returned to Owner in Field ■ Returned to Owner from Kennel ■ Adopted ■ Euthanized ■ DOA


General Information


Telephone Calls

Miles Driven




Revenue


CAS has generated total revenue of \$66,657 year to date. This is approximately **47% Above** the \$45,205 budgeted year to date.

- Animal Fees—\$15,623 YTD


Total Revenue - Budgeted vs. Actual




Total Revenue by Month & Year




Animal License Revenue

The total number of licensed animals fluctuates month-to-month based upon new and expired licenses. As of the end of July, the total number of licensed animals in the City is 4,460 or 17.58% of the estimated canine population of 25,375.
