This Division designs, builds, and maintains roads. They also make the roads we have wider, safer and maintain our roads by filling potholes and laying new asphalt.




Solid Waste

Traffic and Transportation Planning


The Traffic Division maintains the signs, signals, and striping needed to keep people safe on the roads. Transportation planning helps vehicles and people move through the City easily.




Stormwater

The Stormwater Division keeps our roads from flooding during rainstorms and helps keep our waterways clean.



















Safety Message Wheel

Trash, garbage, waste . . . most of it ends up in a landfill. Things that are reusable and recyclable are removed. The rest of the garbage is smashed together, which is called compacting, and then is sent to a landfill.



Recycling is a great way to save natural resources, energy, money and landfill space. Instead of throwing thing into a garbage can, put them into the recycling bin. You can start with newspaper, cardboard, glass (bottles or jars of any shape or color), cans (aluminum and steel), white paper and magazines. You can usually recycle plastics numbered 1-7, (water bottles, shampoo/conditioner, milk jugs), by reading the number in the symbol. Plastic shopping bags can be returned to many stores for recycling.





Water moves in a cycle. Water falls to earth as rain, snow, and other forms of precipitation. It evaporates (fades away) into the air, forms clouds, and falls back to earth again as fresh water.






