It's this kind of collaboration that helps us solve and prevent crime.


ABOUT THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Established in 1858, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office is the oldest law enforcement agency in Colorado. The Sheriff's Office is comprised of three bureaus: Detention Services, Public Safety Services and Support Services. Sheriff Tyler Brown was sworn into office January 2019.

The Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) offers the highest level of comprehensive public safety service to 644,000 people over nearly 900 square miles. The ACSO provides law enforcement and full-time patrol to Centennial, Bennett, Deer Trail, Foxfield and unincorporated Arapahoe County. The county is divided into eight patrol precincts. The ACSO also manages the ACSO Detention Facility.

TRIPLE CROWN STATUS

In 2019, the ACSO maintained its Triple Crown distinction. The Triple Crown award



was established by the National Sheriff's Association to recognize those sheriff's offices that achieve simultaneous accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, the American Correctional Association, and the National Commission on Correctional Health Care. The Triple Crown distinction is so rare, since the establishment of the

award in 1993, fewer than 100 sheriff's offices have qualified.

The 2019 annual report showcases the accomplishments of the people and programs in the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office. It is our honor to provide you with the highest level of public safety service. We're better together.



DETENTION Bureau



The Detention Services Bureau, led by Bureau Chief Vince Line is tasked with managing the custody and care of people confined in a safe, secure and constitutional manner. In addition to housing inmates, the bureau is also responsible for transporting prisoners, executing writs and attending to the courts.

The bureau includes Detention Administration and Detention Operations. The majority of sheriff office employees work in the detention facility.

The Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Detention Facility has been accredited through the American Correctional Association (ACA) since 1991. The

medical unit, which provides medical services to inmates within the facility, has been accredited through the National Commission on Correctional Health Care (NCCHC) since 1989.



ANYWHERE VISIT

The ACSO started Anywhere Visit in 2019. The app saves people time and money because instead of driving to the detention facility, they can now visit incarcerated friends and family virtually anywhere with internet access.

DETENTION ADMINISTRATION

Effectively, classifications and contracts. Captain Halaba also manages employee wellness and new peer support member, Blue.

VOLUNTEERS

The Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Detention Facility is fortunate to have more than 100 volunteers who donate their time to help with various inmate programs, some who generously have volunteered in the detention facility for more than 20 years. More than 75 programs are offered to inmates on a weekly basis and are staffed predominantly by volunteers.



DETENTION OPERATIONS






PUBLIC SAFETY Bureau




The Public Safety Bureau is commanded by Bureau Chief Glenn Thompson. The Bureau oversees Investigation Services, Patrol Operations, Patrol Special Operations and the Narcotics Team.

Public Safety Bureau employees provide quality communication, patrol and investigation services to the estimated 197,045 residents in our service area, which includes: Centennial; Town of Bennett; Town of Deer Trail; Town of Foxfield and Unincorporated Arapahoe County.

NEW PRECINCT 5 SUBSTATION

In March 2019, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office opened a new substation to serve 25,000 residents in the Four Square Mile and Holly Hills neighborhoods. The new substation is located at 1621 South Parker Road. Deputies report to the facility, get briefed via video conferencing, book in evidence, conduct training and hold small community meetings.

While the ACSO has always had a presence there, the new substation has a modern and updated facility for patrol deputies to work. The new facility is helping strengthen the partnership between the ACSO and the community. This is the ACSO's fourth substation.



Investigation Services is managed by Captain Jared Rowlison who is responsible for the operational activities of the Investigation Services Section. Investigators are guided by the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office mission to provide quality service with an emphasis on integrity, professionalism and community spirit. The goal of Investigation Services is to identify suspects, apprehend criminals, collect evidence, provide comprehensive victim services, and to protect the public.

PATROL OPERATIONS



Patrol Operations is led by Captain Dan Joyce. Arapahoe County's 864 square miles are divided into eight precincts or police districts. Area commanders who are lieutenants are responsible for each precinct. They also ensure that effective methods of crime control and quality of life strategies are initiated in their precinct by rapidly deploying personnel and resources to alleviate crime patterns. Deputies enforce

Colorado Revised Statutes and county ordinances enacted by the Arapahoe County Board of County Commissioners and local ordinances of contract cities.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Mental illness is such a huge problem nationwide, the ACSO has launched a new Behavioral Health Response Program. Deputies with crisis intervention training, or in some cases, licensed clinicians, will respond to calls involving mental distress. The training allows deputies to provide more appropriate and earlier access to care and resources.

PATROL SPECIAL OPERATIONS



Patrol Special Operations is led by Captain Ken McKlem. Special Operations includes the Bicycle Team, Bomb Squad, Community Resources Unit, K-9 Unit, School Resource Officers, Special Weapons and Tactics team, Traffic Safety Unit, HAZMAT, Office of Emergency Management and Wildland Fire.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Office of Emergency Management activates as the initial Emergency Operations Center (EOC) staff. In 2019, the EOC activated in varying capacities to coordinate the response to the hurricane force Bomb Cyclone in March.

In 2019, Englewood and Arapahoe County signed an intergovernmental agreement to have our OEM handle emergency

management. Englewood provided funding to hire one new employee, provided a vehicle and will pay the salary and benefits cost of the employee who will work for and with our OEM, gaining the experience, knowledge and networking that would not be possible had Englewood simply hired their own staff. Since counties are responsible to assist and relieve cities in emergencies, this consolidation benefits both entities and is financially responsible.



NARCOTICS TEAM

The Arapahoe County Narcotics Team conducted investigations related to the possession, cultivation, manufacture and distribution of controlled substances and marijuana. In 2019 the Narcotics Team:

UNMANNED AERIAL SYSTEMS UNIT (UAS)
The UAS unit operates the agency's unmanned
aerial systems platforms (small drones) for use in
assisting various missions. A team of pilots use
the ACSO's six aircraft for aerial mapping of
critical infrastructure, high-risk incidents and
school STEM classes. The drones also search for
suspects at large, missing people, crime scenes,
active threats, traffic accidents and are routinely
used on tactical operations by SWAT.









BOMB CYCLONE

On March 11, 2019 at 1:00 p.m., the Arapahoe County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) started tracking a strong and potentially historic winter storm. The initial forecast called for blizzard conditions likely across northeast Colorado on March 13. By 4:00 p.m., the National Weather Service upgraded the watch to a blizzard warning for Arapahoe County.

The strength of the storm was defined as a historic "bomb cyclone." On March 12, the OEM began preparing personnel, equipment and shelters. On March 13, the barometric pressure in Colorado was similar to a Category 2 hurricane. By dawn, there were 450 business, school and government offices closed. Later that day, the Arapahoe County Board of County Commissioners declared a disaster and the Colorado National Guard was activated. There was so much snow, many roads were blocked or closed and vehicles were stranded and abandoned. Our Winter Operations Team executed more than 500 rescues in a 24 hours period.













STEM SHOOTING

On May 7, 2019, a school shooting occurred at STEM School Highlands Ranch, located in Douglas County. One student was killed and eight others were injured. The ACSO responded quickly to assist with more than 50 of our deputies on scene within minutes including our SWAT team, bomb squad, K-9s, school resource officers, traffic unit and our entire command staff.

Ken McKlem, Captain of Patrol Special Operations, recalls a text message he received from the Douglas County Sheriff's Office that read, "Active School shooter @ 8773 Ridgeline Blvd. Highlands Ranch deputies have injured parties inside." He also received information that two suspects were in custody, with a possible third shooter still at large.

Our SWAT team entered the school to help look for a third suspect. They also assisted in rescuing injured students, and clearing rooms to provide a safe way for students to get out.


