NEW MAYOR AND COUNCIL MEMBERS TO BE SWORN IN THIS JANUARY

In January, four new Council Members and the City's next Mayor will be sworn into office. Congratulations to all incoming elected officials!

Christine Sweetland will be sworn in as the fourth Mayor of Centennial. Once sworn in, she will vacate her current seat as the District 2 Council Member. City Council will then discuss options for filling the vacancy.

In District 1, Cindy Sandhu will assume the seat of Council Member Robyn Carnes.

Ashish Vaidya will step into the seat of Council Member Tammy Maurer in District 2.

In District 3, Ryan Dwiggins will be sworn in to succeed Council Member Mike Sutherland.

And in District 4, Durrell Middleton will assume the seat currently held by Council Member Marlo Alston.

Sign Up for Emergency Notification Alerts

Arapahoe County 911 Authority has upgraded ArapAlert, the County's official emergency notification system that keeps residents informed during wildfires, evacuations, shelter-in-place orders and other critical events.

Please note that if you were signed up for alerts through the County's previous alert system, you will need to complete a new registration to receive future notifications. Alerts can come via text or email.

Issue with your Streetlight? Call Us!

Centennial is responsible for maintaining streetlights within City boundaries that were previously owned by Xcel Energy. Most of these streetlights are located on the west side of Parker Road.



PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES: HARD HATS & GREEN LIGHTS

County Line Road Widening

Construction is officially underway on the County Line Road Widening and Reconstruction Project, a \$30 million regional effort led by Douglas County in partnership with the City of Centennial, City of Littleton, and other agencies. The project will deliver several upgrades between University Blvd. and Broadway – including a new traffic signal at Clarkson St., sidewalk additions for improved pedestrian safety, and other improvements to enhance traffic flow and safety.

Construction began in September 2025 and will continue through September 2027. **A 100-day road closure is planned for this winter, beginning in January.**

Arapahoe and Clarkson Traffic Signal Activation, Sept 2025

Arapahoe & Clarkson Signal

The new traffic signal at Arapahoe Rd. and Clarkson St. is fully operational, providing a safer, more accessible intersection for drivers, pedestrians and cyclists. As part of this project new pedestrian signals were installed along with enhanced lighting, updated pavement markings and high visibility striped crosswalks.

The project was funded through the Safer Main Streets Initiative, a partnership between the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and the Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG). The initiative prioritizes safety improvements for vulnerable roadway users — including pedestrians, cyclists, transit riders, older adults, and individuals with disabilities.



Bonus: The new signal also connects existing bike lanes on Clarkson St. to the High Line Canal Trail and the C-470 Trail, creating a more seamless route for cyclists across the City.

Driving with Understanding: The Blue Envelope Program



The Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office has introduced the Blue Envelope Program, an initiative designed to foster safe, respectful and positive interactions between first responders and community members who may face communication challenges related to a condition or disability.

Here's how it works:

Participants can choose to carry a blue envelope – holding items such as a driver's license, registration and insurance – or opt for other indicators including bracelets, key chains, lanyards or bumper stickers featuring the program logo.

When a driver is stopped, the Blue Envelope serves as a signal to officers that the individual may benefit from extra patience, clear communication or reduced sensory triggers.

The goal: to create safer, calmer and more positive interactions for everyone on the road.

Park It Like You Mean It

Centennial is partnering with Denver South, Spin, and the City of Greenwood Village, on a new pilot program testing Sparkpark, a Norwegian micromobility technology company making its North American debut.

The pilot introduces “virtual docking stations” that make it easier — and tidier — to park Spin e-bikes and scooters. Using all solar-powered devices, the system guides riders to designated parking zones, improving accuracy, and helping keep sidewalks safe and clutter-free.

This pilot program launched in October and will run until July 1, 2026 with ten stations planned in Greenwood Village and Centennial.

Centennial is pleased to participate in this effort to support safer, more accessible micromobility options in our community.

City Support for the Unhoused




The City of Centennial collaborates with local organizations to address homelessness in our community. This includes the work of Centennial's Homeless Outreach Coordinator, who provides direct support to individuals and families experiencing homelessness or facing imminent risk.

The Coordinator plays a key role in strengthening partnerships with local agencies and nonprofits, while proactively leading outreach and rehousing efforts.

The goal is to ensure that those who are unsheltered – or at risk of becoming unhoused— receive the support, resources, and opportunities they need.

All sidewalks in the City, with the exception of single family residences, must clear snow when accumulations are four or more inches, regardless of what roadway classification you are adjacent to.

Sidewalks must be clear 24 hours from the end of the snow event.

From Blizzard Wizard to Powda Pusha, these newly named plows are now part of the Centennial Snow Force, working hard to keep our streets clear and safe all winter long.



The My Centennial mobile app gives residents a convenient way to report issues and request services from the City of Centennial.


With just a few taps, you can report potholes, traffic signal problems, graffiti, and more—right from your phone. Snap a photo, and if GPS is enabled, the app will automatically detect your location.

You can:

- Create an account to track your request and receive updates from the City's Citizen Response Center, or submit anonymously if you prefer.
- Download the My Centennial app for free from the App Store or Google Play.
- Requests are acknowledged within 1-2 business days (excluding weekends and holidays). Only the person who submitted the request can view the City's response.

Additional features:

- View and manage your requests anytime
- See requests submitted nearby
- Comment on open requests and reply to comments on your own
