

FUNDING + OPERATIONS

THE ARAPAHOE COUNTY **OPEN SPACE TAX PROGRAM** BEGAN IN 2003 WHEN CITIZENS OF ARAPAHOE COUNTY VOTED TO FUND THE PROGRAM THROUGH A QUARTER-OF-A-PENNY OPEN SPACE SALES AND USE TAX (25 CENTS ON EVERY \$100 SPENT). THIS PROGRAM IS SCHEDULED TO SUNSET IN 2023.














